

<u>A Message from the Parish Council on the Corona Virus</u>

Dear Parishioners,

St. Basil has always been a good citizen of Metairie and Jefferson Parish. The Lord has blessed us with no active cases of the corona virus. We have acted cautiously, made our weekly worship available through livestreaming on the internet and provided additional sanitary measures. Sadly, the virus seems to be taking another swing at the community. Our Governor and Parish President have asked us to take additional and stricter precautions. Starting on Sunday, July 5, we are asking that all persons wear a facemask in church or in the parish hall. The only exceptions are the priest, the subdeacon, the acolytes and choir members during the liturgy when their duties require it. In addition, we ask that parishioners in the pews sit 6 feet apart unless they are members of the same family. We will have a limited supply of facemasks if you did not bring your own. Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



The possum family under your altar likes to gather after supper to study a chapter or two from the Holy Bible. Members of the family take turns reading chapters aloud. We use the Orthodox Study Bible, which we call the "OSB." This bible first came out in 1993 and has been approved for use by the Greek. Antiochian and OCA

churches and was highly recommended by Metropolitan PHILIP. The OSB was the result of a unique collaboration of Orthodox scholars including Fr. Peter Gillquist and Fr. Thomas Hopko. It contains a good article by Bishop KALLISTOS (Ware) on how to read the bible and other study articles. There are many notes and commentaries, which clarify the Orthodox viewpoint on important passages in the bible. The OSB also contains 12 icons and an introduction to the Orthodox Church. It has maps and a glossary of bible terms. A good feature is the daily lectionary so that you can follow the recommended church calendar readings throughout the year. Orthodox morning and evening prayers are also included. Critics say that the OSB could have been a better Orthodox bible but none say that it is not theologically sound. The Parish bookstore usually has copies or it can be purchased on line. May you and your family find it helpful on your Orthodox journey. Blessings to all—Theo
