

St. Spyridon the Wonderworker, Bishop of Tremithus

The island of Cyprus was both the birthplace and the place where this glorious saint served the Church. Spyridon was born of simple parents, farmers, and he remained simple and humble until his death. He married in his youth and had children, but when his wife died he devoted himself completely to the service of God. Because of his exceptional piety, he was chosen as bishop of the city of Tremithus. Yet even as a bishop he did not change his simple way of living, handling his livestock and cultivating his land himself. He used very little of the fruits of his labor for himself; instead, he distributed a greater share to the needy. He manifested great miracles by God's power: he brought down rain in time of drought, stopped the flow of a river, raised several people from the dead, healed Emperor Constantius of a grave illness, saw and heard angels of God, foresaw future events, discerned the secrets of men's hearts, converted many to the true Faith, and did much else. He took part in the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea [325], and he brought many heretics back to Orthodoxy by his simple and clear expositions of the Faith as well as by his mighty miracles. He was so simply dressed that once, when he wanted to enter the imperial court at the invitation of the emperor, a soldier, thinking that he was a beggar, struck him on the face. Meek and guileless, Spyridon turned the other cheek to him. He glorified God through many miracles, and was of benefit, not only to many individuals but also to the whole Church of God. He entered into rest in the Lord in the year 348. His miracleworking relics rest on the island of Corfu, and even today they glorify God with many miracles.

A Message from the Parish Council on Parish Hall Repairs

Dear Parishioners, the Parish Council has decided to replace the damaged shingle roof on the Parish Hall with a metal roof like the one we have on the church. While a metal roof is more expensive, we believe it will pay off in the long run as we will surely be dealing with more hurricanes in the future. We accepted a bid (the lower of two) from the same contractor who put the metal roof on the church. That roof has served us well. The roof replacement will cost about \$80,000. Insurance, donations from the Archdiocese, the Diocese and other angels will cover most of the cost but we also need to make repairs to the restrooms. We will, at least temporarily, need to dip into reserve funds. The roof repairs will be done in the spring. Restroom repairs cannot be made until the roof is restored. Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



The possum family under the altar has noticed the joyful bell ringing at the Sunday Liturgy. It sent me to the Parish library to read up on Orthodox bell ringing. Bells were first used at the Hagia Sophia Cathedral in the late 800's and in Russia by the year 1000. Their primary purpose was to summon Parishioners to church and to mark important points in the

Liturgy. They were also used to warn inhabitants of towns or cities of approaching armies and attackers. Unlike the Western Church where the bell swings and the dapper is stationary, in the Orthodox Church the dapper strikes against a stationary bell. For the time being, St. Basil will ring the bell at the beginning of the Liturgy and when the bread and wine are consecrated. In the future, it may be rung on other occasion as Fr. Peter deems appropriate. Let us give thanks to all whose gifts made the purchase and installation of the bell possible. God bless the ministry of bell ringing and all who hear St. Basil's bell---Theo
