

St. Peter the Apostle (The Chains of St. Peter)

St. Peter is commemorated on this day because of the chains by which he was shackled by the lawless Herod and which during the appearance of an angel in prison fell from him, "Suddenly the angel of the Lord stood by him and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and awakened him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' The chains fell from his wrists" (Acts of the Apostles 12:7). The chains were preserved by Christians as much for the memory of this great apostle as well as for their healing power, for many of the sick were healed by touching them as well as with the towel of the Apostle Paul, "then when the face cloths or aprons that touched his skin were applied to the sick, their diseases left them and the evil spirits came out of them" (Acts of the Apostles 19:12). St. Juvenal, the Patriarch of Ierusalem gave these chains as a gift to the Empress Eudocia, the exiled wife of the Emperor Theodosius the Younger. She divided them into two and sent one half to the Church of the Holy Apostle in Constantinople and the other half to her daughter Empress Eudoxia in Rome, the wife of Valentian. Eudoxia built the Church of St. Peter and deposited these chains in it, together with those chains with which Peter was shackled before his death under Emperor Nero.

A Message from the Parish Council on Parish Hall Repairs

Dear Parishioners, the Parish Council has decided to replace the damaged shingle roof on the Parish Hall with a metal roof like the one we have on the church. While a metal roof is more expensive, we believe it will pay off in the long run as we will surely be dealing with more hurricanes in the future. We accepted a bid (the lower of two) from the same contractor who put the metal roof on the church. That roof has served us well. The roof replacement will cost about \$80,000. Insurance, donations from the Archdiocese, the Diocese and other angels will cover most of the cost but we also need to make repairs to the restrooms. We

will, at least temporarily, need to dip into reserve funds. The roof repairs will be done in the spring. Restroom repairs cannot be made until the roof is restored. The little possums think they are bit repetitious. In fact, they're all a little different. The first is the "Great Ektenia." We pray for peace, the church, the clergy, our President, our community, good

weather and crops, travelers, the sick and to be free from "tribulation, wrath, danger and necessity." The "Ektenia of Fervent Supplication" is also a prayer for clergy but there is now an emphasis on the spiritual welfare of all Orthodox people and for the remission of sins of all the living and the departed. In the "Ektenia of the Prothesis," the prayers are focused on our personal spiritual lives as we ask for "a perfect, holy, peaceful and sinless day, a guardian angel, repentance and a Christian ending to our lives. In the "Ektenia before the Lord's Prayer" we also ask for divine grace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Finally, in the "Ektenia of Thanksgiving," we thank our God for receiving the life-giving body and blood of Christ. Yes, we tell the little ones, there is repetition but, if you listen carefully, these prayers give us a rich and full opportunity to seek God's help and to obtain his mercy---Theo
