

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St. Gregory the Dialogist, Pope of Rome

He was the son of Senator Gordianus and afterward a senator himself and mayor of the city of Rome. As soon as his father died, Gregory surrendered himself to the spiritual life. From his wealth he built six monasteries in Sicily, and built a seventh in the city of Rome in honor of St. Andrew the Apostle, where he was tonsured a monk. Sylvia, his mother, entered a convent and was tonsured a nun. After the death of Pope Pelagius II, Gregory was chosen pope. He fled from this honor and authority, hiding himself in the mountains and ravines. Nevertheless, the Lord revealed him to those who were seeking him in the following manner: a fiery column arose from earth to heaven at the place where Gregory hid himself. He was exceptionally charitable. All of his income was used for building shelters and hospices for the needy. Often, he invited less fortunate men and served them at the table. He spent his time writing beneficial books. He is also called the Dialogist because he wrote a book called *The Dialogues*, in which he extolled the miracles of the Italian saints. He also composed the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, which is celebrated on Wednesdays and Fridays of Great Lent. His Archdeacon Peter saw a dove flying above Gregory's head as he was seated writing. He presented himself to the Lord in the year 604 A.D.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



A terrible earthquake struck parts of Turkey and Syria on February 6, 2023. As of this writing, over 45,000 lives have been lost. The Turkish city of Antakya was nearly destroyed, including its principal Orthodox church. We know the city by its earlier name, Antioch. Along with Rome and Alexandria, it was one of the three great capitals of the Roman Empire. The

term "Christians" was first used there to describe our Lord's followers. St. Paul and St. Barnabas formed the first church in Antioch and preached there for a year. St. Peter established the first bishopric. The historic cave church in which he preached apparently survived the earthquake,

saved by the mountain from which it was carved. In 325 A.D., the Council of Nicaea elevated the Antiochian church to a Patriarchy. It remained headquartered in Antioch until 1342 A.D when it moved to Damascus, Syria. It's sad to see such a place of historic significance forever changed. However, Antiochian Orthodox Christians continue to worship under the leadership of our Patriarch JOHN X and soon-to-be Metropolitan SABA. We pray for our brothers and sisters who are suffering and grieving. Our parishioners gave over \$1,700 to the victims of the earthquake. May the Orthodox church in Antioch rise from the dust and restore its holy places.

The traditional fasting discipline of Great and Holy Lent (no meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, alcohol and oil) is observed during the entire Great Fast, which lasts from Pure Monday through Great and Holy Saturday. On Saturdays and Sundays, however, alcohol and oil are allowed, except on Great and Holy Saturday when no oil is permitted. Fish, alcohol and oil are permitted on the Feast of the Annunciation (March 25th) and Palm Sunday.

Each year we begin our Archdiocese-wide **Food For Hungry People Campaign** at this time. This campaign has raised millions of dollars over the 30+ years of its existence. Please take one of the coin boxes in the narthex home with you and place your coins in it during Great Lent and

return the boxes at PASCHA. The proceeds will be collected and forwarded to the Archdiocese Chancery for distribution to the needy. May God bless your generosity and ascetic practice of almsgiving.

The **Sacrament of Holy Confession** is good for the health and salvation of the soul and body. For long-term, good, physical health, regular visits to the family doctor are appropriate. Likewise, care for our souls is a necessity. If it is your desire to receive the Eucharist at Great and Holy PASCHA, then please make every effort to care for your soul and have confession at least once during Great Lent.

Lenten potluck meals shall be served after Presanctified Liturgies on Wednesday evenings during Great Lent.
