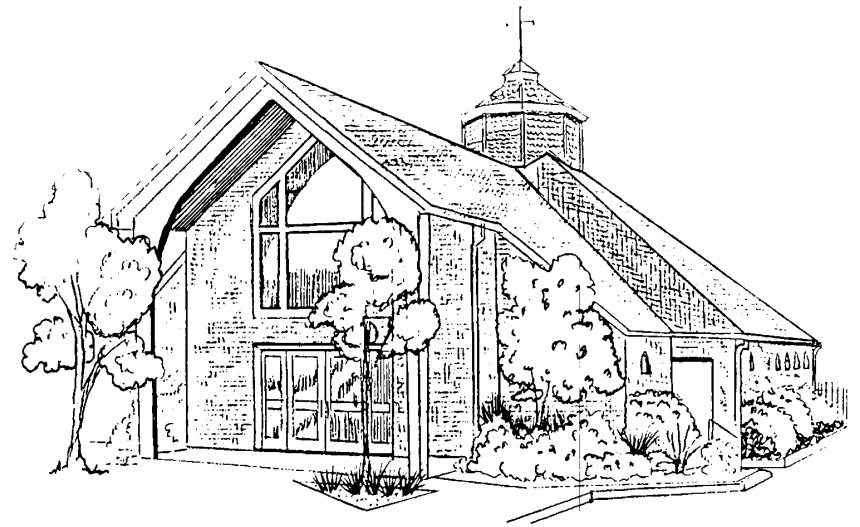

From his youth, Titus loved Christ the Lord and detested the vanities of the world. Because of this, he retreated from the world, entered a monastery and received the angelic habit [The Great Schema-The Angelic Face]. Without regret, he dedicated himself to the somber and narrow path of monasticism. Through great patience, he attained two basic virtues: humility and obedience. In these virtues he surpassed "not only the brethren, but also all men." From his youth he preserved the purity of his soul and body. At the time of the iconoclastic heresy, he proved himself to be an unwavering pillar of the Church of God. Because of his great humility and purity, God bestowed upon him the gift of performing miracles, both during his lifetime and after his death. When he went to the Lord he left behind a countless number of disciples. He died peacefully in the ninth century.

Upon entering it, please refrain from unnecessary conversation before, during and after church services, most especially during the Divine Liturgy from the time of the consecration of the Gifts until the last person has received the Eucharist. At the end of the Divine Liturgy, please come quietly forward to receive a piece of the antidoron and exit the church temple without talking. During coffee hour in the Church Hall is the appropriate place to exchange personal greetings and converse with one another. May God bless your reverence and piety.*

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



A terrible earthquake struck parts of Turkey and Syria on February 6, 2023. As of this writing, over 45,000 lives have been lost. The Turkish city of Antakya was nearly destroyed, including its principal Orthodox church. We know the city by its earlier name, Antioch. Along with Rome and Alexandria, it was one of the three great capitals of the Roman Empire. The term “Christians” was first used there to describe our Lord’s followers. St. Paul and St. Barnabas formed the first church in Antioch and preached there for a year. St. Peter established the first bishopric. The historic cave church in which he preached apparently survived the earthquake, saved by the mountain from which it was carved. In 325 A.D., the Council of Nicaea elevated the Antiochian church to a Patriarchy. It remained headquartered in Antioch until 1342 A.D. when it moved to Damascus,

Syria. It is sad to see such a place of historic significance forever changed. However, Antiochian Orthodox Christians continue to worship under the leadership of our Patriarch JOHN X and soon-to-be Metropolitan SABA. We pray for our brothers and sisters who are suffering and grieving. Our parishioners gave over \$1,700 to the victims of the earthquake. May the Orthodox church in Antioch rise from the dust and restore its holy places.

Parents and teachers please note there is no Church School on Sunday April 9 and 16

The traditional fasting discipline of Great and Holy Lent (no meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, alcohol and oil) is observed during the entire Great Fast, which lasts from Pure Monday through Great and Holy Saturday. On Saturdays and Sundays, however, alcohol and oil are allowed, except on Great and Holy Saturday when no oil is permitted. Fish, alcohol and oil are permitted on the Feast of the Annunciation (March 25th) and Palm Sunday.

Each year we begin our Archdiocese-wide **Food For Hungry People Campaign** at this time. This campaign has raised millions of dollars over the 30+ years of its existence. Please take one of the coin boxes in the narthex home with you and place your coins in it during Great Lent and return the boxes at PASCHA. The proceeds will be collected and forwarded to the Archdiocese Chancery for distribution to the needy. May God bless your generosity and ascetic practice of almsgiving.

The **Sacrament of Holy Confession** is good for the health and salvation of the soul and body. For long-term, good, physical health, regular visits to the family doctor are appropriate. Likewise, care for our souls is a necessity. If it is your desire to receive the Eucharist at Great and Holy

PASCHA, then please make every effort to care for your soul and have confession at least once during Great Lent.

Lenten potluck meals shall be served after Presanctified Liturgies on Wednesday evenings during Great Lent.

On Monday, April 3, His Grace Bishop NICHOLAS will visit us. A Lenten potluck luncheon will be served at 11:30 A.M. At 6 P.M. that evening we shall have a Lenten potluck dinner. Please join us for one of those meals as we receive our beloved bishop.
