

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The Holy Apostle James

James was the son of Zebedee, the brother of John and one of the Twelve Apostles. At the invitation of the Lord Jesus, James left his fishermen's net and his father and, together with John, immediately followed after the Lord. He belonged to that trinity of apostles to whom the Lord revealed the greatest mysteries, before whom He was transfigured on Tabor, and before whom He was in agony in the Garden of Gethsemane preceding His passion. After receiving the Holy Spirit, he preached the Gospel in various places and traveled to Spain. Upon his return from Spain, the Jews began to quarrel with him concerning Holy Scripture, but no one was able to withstand him, not even a certain magician, Hermogenes. Hermogenes and his disciple Philip were defeated by the power of the truth which James preached, and both of them were baptized. Then the Jews accused James before Herod and persuaded a certain Josias to slander the apostle. Josias, seeing the brave conduct of James and listening to his clear explanation of the truth, repented and believed in Christ. When James was condemned to death, this same Josias was also condemned to death. En route to the place of execution, Josias implored James to forgive him the sin of slander. James embraced and kissed him and said: "Peace and forgiveness be to you!" Both of them bowed their heads under the sword and were beheaded for the Lord, Whom they loved and Whom they served. St. James suffered in Jerusalem in the year 45 A.D. His body was translated to Spain, where miraculous healings occur over his grave even to this day.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



Orthodox people are regularly exposed to the Bible during the reading of the Epistle and the Gospel. The Psalms are recited during other services. The Antiochian Church calendar provides a lectionary for daily readings. An additional resource for all Orthodox is the

Orthodox Study Bible. The current edition was published in 2008 and is available in our parish bookstore. It consists of the "Septuagint," the earliest Greek translation of the Old Testament from the second and third centuries before Christ. Our Lord quoted many of its scriptures. Unlike versions of the Old Testament used by other Christian churches, it also contains The Prayer of King Manasseh (after 2 Chronicles 30), and additions to the Book of Daniel. The New Testament is the so-called New King James Version (NKJV). It is faithful to the "textus receptus," the old King James Bible, the first Greek-to-English Bible published in 1611 A.D., but updates some of its antiquated language. The Orthodox Study Bible also contains an introduction to the Orthodox Church, the lectionary, morning and evening prayers, useful footnotes, icons, and maps. It has an excellent article by Bishop Kallistos Ware on how to read the Bible. Footnotes and explanatory material are in language which is easy to understand. This Bible was highly recommended by Metropolitan PHILIP, who was involved in its publication.
