

# The placing of the girdle (robe) of the All Holy Birth-Giver of God in the Church of Blachernae in Constantinople

In the time of Emperor Leo the Great (457-474 A.D.) and Empress Verina and Patriarch Gennadius, two noblemen from Constantinople, Galibus and Candidus, were traveling in the Holy Land to venerate the holy places. They stopped in Nazareth for a while, at the home of a Jewish maiden who kept the robe of the All-Holy Mother of God in a secret room. Many who were ill and in need received healing of their sufferings through prayer and by touching the robe. Galibus and Candidus brought this holy object to Constantinople and reported it to the emperor and patriarch. This brought about great joy in the imperial city. The robe was solemnly placed in the Church of Blachernae. (This church had been built by Emperor Marcian and Empress Pulcheria on the shore of an inlet, and was called Blachernae after Blacheran, a commander from Scetis, who had been slain there.) This feast was instituted in remembrance of the placing of the robe of the All-Holy Birth-giver of God in the Church of Blachernae.

During coffee hour in the Church Hall is the appropriate place to exchange personal greetings and converse with one another. May God bless your reverence and piety.

## **Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum**



Following the Pentecost Liturgy, we joined together in the so-called Kneeling Prayers. Orthodox people do not kneel often and this is the first time after Pascha that we kneel. These prayers are read in church only once a year. They were written by St. Basil the Great, our patron saint. The prayers are intended to serve as a transition from the joy

and celebration of Pascha to the day-to-day focus on repentence required of us. The prayers are very long and beautiful and are best appreciated as devotional reading during this time of the Church year. There are three prayers. The first is addressed to God the Father. The second addresses our Lord Jesus and invokes the Holy Spirit. The third prayer recalls the Lord's saving grace for both the living and the dead. The Kneeling Prayers are easily found on the internet and are especially suitible for reading aloud during family prayers. In the words of the first Kneeling Prayer, "O tranquil haven of the storm tossed... make known to me the way wherein I should walk. Grant to my reasoning the Spirit of Thy wisdom and give the Spirit of understanding to my foolishness. Overshadow my deeds with the Spirit of Thy fear and renew a right Spirit within me... that I may be vouch-safed to keep Thy commandmennts and always to remember Thy glorious coming-again." ---Theo
