

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The Venerable Romanus the Melodist

Romanus was born in the Syrian town of Emesa. He was, at first, a sexton in Beirut, and later served in the cathedral church in Constantinople in the time of Patriarch Euthymius (490-504). Romanus was not well educated and was untrained in chanting, for which he was ridiculed by some of the more educated clergy. St. Romanus tearfully prayed to the Most-holy Theotokos, and she appeared to him in a dream, gave him a scroll, and told him to swallow it. The following day was the Feast of the Nativity. Romanus took his place as a chanter at the ambo, and with an angelic voice sang the hymn "Today the Virgin..." All were amazed at both the content of this hymn and at the magnificent singing of the chanter. Having received the poetic gift from the Theotokos, Romanus composed over a thousand Kontakia. Romanus entered into rest as a deacon of the Great Church, Hagia Sophia, in Constantinople. He joined the angelic choirs in the year 510.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



A bearded St. Basil looks upon us from his icon in the iconostasis and from another icon behind the altar. Our patron saint lived during the fourth century in Cappadocia, now in Turkey. St. Basil became a monk in 356 A.D. and later a Bishop. He wrote extensively, including the Divine Liturgy which we use on feast days, Sundays in Great Lent and on his

commemoration day, January 1. St. Basil was a famous preacher, known for his care of the needy. He is referred to as St. Basil "the Great" because of his authoritative teaching of the doctrines of the Church. Much of his life was spent fighting the Arian heresy, which contended that Christ was not divine. He was known for his strong defense of the theology reflected in the Nicene Creed. Always in poor health and depicted as very serious in his icons, yet he was optimistic, tender, and even playful. However, he did not waver in his commitment to the poor: "At this very moment, what prevents you from giving? Are not the needy near at hand? Are your barns not already full? Is not your heavenly reward waiting? Is not the commandment crystal clear? The hungry are perishing, the naked are freezing to death, the debtors cannot breathe, and will you put off showing mercy until tomorrow? Make your brothers and sisters sharers of your wealth; give to the needy today what rots away tomorrow." --- Theo
