

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The Venerable Martyrs Galaction and Episteme

Both Galaction and Episteme were born in the city of Edessa, in Phoenicia. Galaction's mother was barren until she was baptized. After her baptism, she converted her husband [Cleitophon] to the true Faith, baptized her son Galaction, and raised him in the Christian Faith. When Galaction was old enough to marry, his good mother, Leucippa, entered into rest, and his father betrothed him to a pagan-born maiden named Episteme. By no means did Galaction want to enter into marriage, and convinced Episteme to be baptized, then to be tonsured a nun at the same time that he became a monk. Both of them withdrew to Mount Publion—Galaction to a monastery and Episteme to a convent. They proved to be shining lights in their monasteries. They were first in labor, first in prayer, first in humility and obedience, and first in love. They neither left their monasteries nor did they see one another until just before their death. A fierce persecution began and both of them were brought before the tribunal. When the pagans mercilessly whipped Galaction, Episteme wept. Then they whipped her. After that, they cut off their hands, their feet and then their heads. Their friend, Eutolius, took their bodies and honorably buried them. Eutolius had been a slave of Episteme's parents, and then a monk with Galaction. He also wrote the life of these wonderful martyrs of Christ who suffered and received their wreaths in heaven in the year 253.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



There are some important messages and prayers contained in the large icons of the church. Behind the altar table, there are icons of four saints. Each is holding a scroll. St. James, the brother of our Lord, admonishes us "Be ye doers of the word and not hearers only." St. John

Chrysostom's scroll proclaims "It is meet and right to hymn thee, to bless thee, to praise thee, to give thanks to thee, and to worship thee in every place of thy dominion." Our patron St. Basil's icon invokes the Lord to "Unite all of us to one another who become partakers of the one bread and cup." There is also an icon of St. Gregory Dialogos, a Pope of Rome from 590 to 604 A.D. He is the author of the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts. His scroll is a prayer that the Lord "Look upon us thine unworthy servants who stand at this holy altar as at thy cherubimic throne." In the iconostasis, St. Herman of Alaska urges that "From this day, from this hour, from this minute, let us love God above all." St. Anthony the Great observes that "A great work for a man is repenting of his sins before God and expecting temptation to his last breath." As we reflect on these iconic messages, may the meditations of our hearts be always acceptable unto thee, O Lord. ---Theo

The Advent Fast begins Wednesday, November 15th, and is divided into two periods. The first period is Nov. 15 – Dec. 19, with the traditional fasting discipline observed (no meat, poultry, dairy, eggs, fish, alcohol, and oil). There is an allowance, however, for alcohol and oil on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and an allowance for alcohol, oil and fish on Saturdays and Sundays. The second period is Dec. 20–24, with the traditional fasting discipline observed. There is an allowance, however, for alcohol and oil only on Saturday and Sunday.

With God's help, we will have a mini-retreat after Divine Liturgy on Sunday, Nov. 19. Fr. Peter will speak in-depth on the Church's teachings on personhood and what it is to be male and female. Everyone is invited to participate.
