Syncletica was of Macedonian descent. She was educated in Alexandria. As a wealthy and distinguished maiden, she had many suitors, but she rejected them all and fled from her parents' home to a convent. Undergoing the greatest of self-restraints, vigils and prayer, Syncletica lived to her eightieth year. Her counsels to the nuns have always been considered a true spiritual pearl, for this righteous one did not attain the heights of wisdom through books but through sufferings, pains, daily and nightly contemplation, and spiritual communication with the higher world of the Divine. With her soul, she took up habitation in that higher world in the year 350 A.D. Among other things, St. Syncletica was known to say, "If it is the season for fasting, do not dismiss fasting, allegedly because of illness for, behold, even those who do not fast, succumb to the same illness." She further spoke, "As when uncovered treasure is quickly seized, so it is with virtue; when it is made public becomes eclipsed and becomes lost."

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



On December 20, the Holy Orthodox Church commemorates the death of St. John of Kronstadt. He was born in 1829 in a village in Siberia and died in 1908. From his childhood, he exhibited a deep religious faith which led him to the priesthood. He served the church in a town outside of St. Petersburg, Russia, home to the Russian Navy. Located on an is-

land, it was a place of great poverty and a place of exile for criminals. He was tireless in visiting the sick and the poor, often returning home without coat or shoes because he had given them away. He performed so many healing miracles that thousands attended his daily Divine Liturgy. Unable to hear the confessions of all that asked him for them, it became necessary to have parishioners confess sins to each other, followed by a communal absolution. He foresaw the Russian revolution, the coming wave of atheism and the death of thousands of Orthodox Christians. His down-to-earth teachings are available in the book "Spiritual Counsels" by St. Vladimir's Seminary Press. One of his prayers follows:

[Lord] Your name is love: do not shun me, a person who has gone astray. Your name is strength: strengthen me, who am exhausted and falling down. Your name is light: enlighten my soul which is darkened with earthly passions. Your name is peace: calm my restless soul. Your name is mercy: do not cease to have mercy upon me. —Theo
