

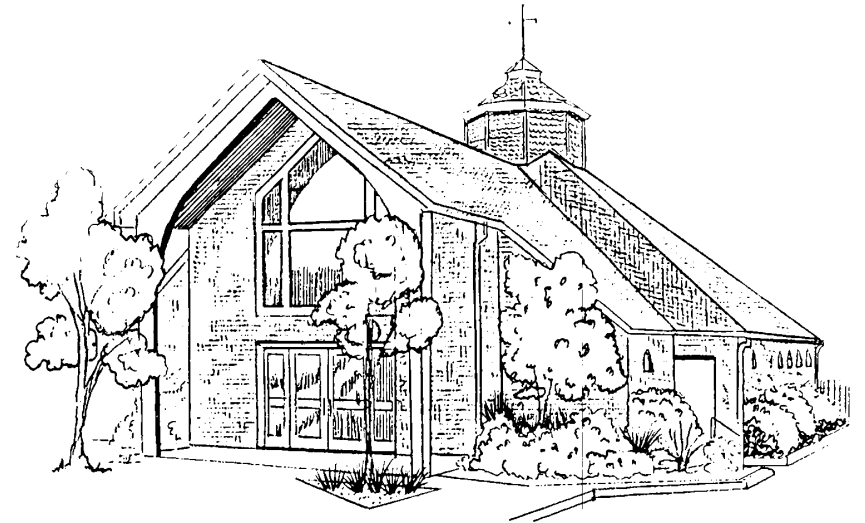
St. Basil Antiochian Orthodox Church

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The Holy Martyrs Alphaeus, Philadelphus And Cyprinus

All three were brothers and the sons of Prince Vitalis in Southern Italy. They were men of nobility and strong in faith. Condemned for their faith in Christ they were led from one judge to another; from one torturer to another. They were taken to Sicily and were slain there during the reign of Emperor Licinius. Alphaeus' tongue was severed and having shed much blood, he died. Philadelphus was burned on an iron grate and Cyprinus in fire. Their incorrupt relics were discovered in 1517 A.D. The three brothers appeared to St. Euthalia (March 2).

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



Most English-speaking Orthodox Christians have used the Orthodox Study Bible (OSB) since it first published the Old and New Testament in one volume in 2008. For the Old Testament, it provides an English translation of the Greek Septuagint prepared by the St. Athanasius Academy of Orthodox Theology. The Septuagint is the earliest Greek translation of the Hebrew Bible used by Jesus and the Apostles. For the New Testament, the Orthodox Study Bible offers the New King James Version (NKJV), a revision of the King James Bible, based on the Greek New Testament written during the first two centuries of Christianity. The NKJV was the product of Protestant translators. Since the OSB, other Orthodox bibles have become available. St. Ignatius Orthodox Press has published the **Orthodox Lectionary Bible**. This bible is organized in accordance with the Lectionary of the Orthodox Church. It is helpful for those who wish to follow the Church's recommended daily readings. However, because it follows the Lectionary, it is not a complete bible. The NewRome Press has published the **Holy Bible Reader's Edition**. It contains a new literal English Language Septuagint and the Eastern Orthodox New Testament from the Greek church. For a New Testament only, the Holy Apostles Convent offers **The Orthodox New Testament** in two volumes as well as a one volume pocket edition. For the serious Orthodox bible student, many choices are now available. May the words of the Holy Scripture inspire and enlighten us all —Theo

Our Littlest Members

Christ said, "Let the little children come to Me, and do not forbid them; for such is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 19:14). In the Orthodox Church, we embrace and welcome our littlest parishioners to join in the Divine Liturgy. They are our future and we want them raised from birth involved in the liturgical experience.

While generally, silence and stillness are valued in worship, the noise of children, especially if they are playfully making noise or expressing themselves, is often viewed as a part of the joyful and vibrant nature of Orthodox worship. It is considered "Holy Noise." The beautiful, resonating sound of our children's cooing or laughter is warming to our hearts.

However, if your child should become fussy, out of control, or inconsolable, please be respectful to those around you and leave the Nave to provide comfort for our little member. They can be brought outside or to St. Basil's Comfort Room. Once consoled and in good spirits, return with our sweet parishioner to resume the liturgy.

Please also remember that there is **NO FOOD** allowed in church and that includes baby formula (bottle-feeding) and snacks. If our little one is hungry, please bring them to the St. Basil's Comfort Room to feed them. The exception to that is our breastfed little ones. Breastfeeding during worship services is acceptable, but with a focus on discretion and modesty.

To our parents of little ones, we join you in loving prayer and support as you raise the next generation of Orthodox believers. GOD BLESS YOU!
